FROM YOUR CHIEF OBSERVER

SPEED

I have noticed how fast drivers travel especially along narrow estate roads, where on occasions children were playing, people were walking to and from vehicles – lots of activity, but this doesn't slow motorists down, they still forge ahead regardless of anyone else.

The widths of the roads are further reduced by inconsiderate parking – sometimes vehicles are parked opposite ones which had already stopped and the driver had left the vehicle, making the available road width even narrower. Their thought process may be 'I'm parking here because I live here or I always park here'.

On occasions I have left my van and began calling at nearby addresses. When I returned someone had parked within an inch or two of the bumper: obviously I had parked in 'their' spot on the Queen's highway where there were no restrictions. Sometimes, I am approached and asked to move the van a few feet, as 'I park there'. I usually move the van.

The congestion of parked vehicles doesn't appear to alter some motorists' speed as they go through such areas: they still appear to travel too fast round bends not knowing what is round the corner. On occasions, I have needed to walk quicker than normal to avoid a speeding motorist, which when listening to the sound of the engine as they approached – hadn't altered as they hadn't reduced the pressure the accelerator.

Occasionally, a series of traffic speed surveys are carried out on roads where speeding is an issue, then after a consultation period and a few months later, road humps may appear.

Reading an edition of a local evening newspaper recently, dated 1^{st} October 2015, I noticed an article, which was towards the back of the paper – a Public Notice had been published by the local council.

In a local area, some 25 roads will have a new speed limit of 20mph instead of 30mph and a restriction on vehicles exceeding 7.5 tonnes except vehicle loading/unloading at adjacent premises or to access off street parking. This would be to prevent such vehicles using those roads as a through route.

On 5 of those roads, a total of 28 sets of speed cushions 75mm high and 14 road humps 55mm high will be installed unless sufficient objections are received by the council.

These new traffic Orders drawn up by the council are probably due to lots of instances of drivers travelling too fast on roads which have restricted widths and still continue to maintain speeds inappropriate for the area.

As and when the road humps are installed, every motorist travelling along the roads identified in the Public Notice will have to reduce speed and negotiate speed humps or other traffic calming measures. Once road humps or chicanes are put in on roads where speeding is a problem, they usually stay to the annoyance of the majority of drivers.

All these measures have probably been brought about by inconsiderate drivers, over a long period of time, exceeding the speed limit to a greater extent.

Do not go off the boil!

When you pass your test—let us know via your observer so that all the group can celebrate your success.

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IAM NEWS RELEASES / FACT SHEETS

THE ADVANCED DRIVING TEST

What the Examiner expects

The Test takes about 90 minutes, over all types of roads and using your own car. The four essential qualities are **Concentration**, **Observation**, **Anticipation** and **Planning**. The Examiner is the holder of a Police Advanced Driving Certificate. A full understanding of what is expected can be found in the IAM publication "Pass Your Advanced Driving Test" or "Pass Your Advanced Motorcycling Test" as appropriate. A number of important points are mentioned here:

THE PRINCIPLES OF ADVANCED DRIVING

- Do you concentrate properly and avoid distractions?
- Can you read the road and anticipate potential hazards in good time?
- Are hazards dealt with in a planned and systematic way?
- Do you use your mirrors before changing your speed or position and do you always give a signal to other road users if they will benefit or appreciate one?
- Can you drive with reasonable restraint, but not indecision?
- Is your judgement of speed and distance accurate?
- Do you drive with courtesy and consideration for other road users, including pedestrians?
- Are you always in the right place on the road, travelling at the right speed with the right gear engaged and able to stop safely in the distance you can see to be clear?

HANDLING SKILLS

- Are steering actions safe, smooth and accurate, and do you pass the wheel through your hands?
- Are gears smoothly and correctly selected?
- Do you make full use of automatic transmission, if your car is fitted with it?
- Is your braking smooth and progressive?
- Do you use "acceleration sense"?

ADVANCED DRIVING SKILLS ON THE ROAD

- Do you keep up a reasonable pace and maintain good progress if conditions permit?
- Do you anticipate and react correctly to the situations developing ahead?
- Are the correct road position chosen and signals given in good time for the next manoeuvre?
- Are all signals, signs and road markings observed, obeyed and approached correctly?
- Are overtaking manoeuvres carried out smoothly, decisively and safely?
- Do you drive with proper restraint and proper sensitivity of control when the roads are slippery or visibility is reduced?
- Are manoeuvres such as parking, reversing, carried out smoothly and competently with effective all-round observations?

Advanced Drivers are expected to control the risks, despite the incorrect actions of others. Every journey can have its unexpected moments.

However, even successful candidates have made minor mistakes, which did not prevent them from passing the Advanced Driving Test.


New Members - are required to complete the Group Membership Form which will be sent to you upon when contact is first made by our Group.
