Welcome to our first newsletter of 2017 and I'd like to share some items with you following recent Committee and other meetings.

The surprising fact that has come to light is that people who passed their Advanced Driving test over five years ago are at a slightly raised risk of becoming an Insurance claim statistic, unless they have undertaken further training or guidance within that period.

There is now a situation that **IAM Surety Insurance** will only give their best rate to those who have passed the Advanced Test in the last 5 years and this will be starting to be applied very soon. So be aware of this should this be your choice of insurance company.

This has given me some significant food for thought and with it being almost 20 years since I took my Advanced Car test believe I should lead by example as your Chairman, so will be applying for a voluntary re-test in the coming months.

Also—<u>all</u> of your Group Committee who have not passed their Advanced Test within the last 5 years will be retaking their Advanced test too! Your Chief Observer, **Roy Richards**, has already retaken successfully. <u>Question for you</u>—will you retake yours? A thought for you!

If any of you would like to have some support ahead of you taking your own re-test then let us know and I am sure we will help you to achieve the right outcome again.

This year both IAM RoadSmart and our own Group are focusing the recruitment of younger drivers and I am pleased to advise we and they are going to offer fully funded places to a limited number of young drivers (persons under 25) giving them a full refund on the successful completion by passing their test, having been given guidance through our Group.

David Gallagher—is now our <u>Young Driver Ambassador</u>, please pass his contact details which are on our Groups Website and page 9 of this Newsletter. Also, he has written an article as the Group Young Driver Contact introducing himself and the associated subject detail for our readers (see page 4).

We are at that time of our year again when your Group membership renewal is due at the end of March. Attendance at one 'Associate Evening' by Associate Members-is required.

Do remember - When you have taken a 'pre-test' drive - and have been recommended to take your actual IAM Test be aware this recommendation will come from you having demonstrated the standard that we expect of you to pass - however - it will still depend on your driving on the actual day of your IAM test with an IAM Examiner. Your actual Test application will done via the IAM DTE database and the group's database user. Within 2-3 weeks - an Examiner will normally contact you to arrange a date, time and location for your actual test.

After taking your test - please let your Observer and Chief Observer know of the result as soon as possible. This allows us to say 'well done' — and to free your Observer for any waiting Associate.

Observers- tell your Chief Observer when your Associate passes-as we would much rather be told twice than not at all!

FROM YOUR CHIEF OBSERVER

On 22nd October 2016, Jonathan Hughes and myself, represented our group at the National Conference held at Aston University Birmingham. The day consisted of a series of five Workshop sessions attended by between 180 and 200 delegates,

At the start of the Conference, we were split into groups, each group proceeded to attend all of the workshops, on a rotational basis, throughout the day. Full copies of each of the Workshop presentations are now available on our group website.

Space does not permit me the opportunity to cover each presentation however the workshop relating to insurance matters was of particular importance.

In attendance on the day, were representatives from IAM Surety. The presentation revealed some interesting and, thought provoking facts, from statistics gathered over the last ten years (the time that Surety has been operating on behalf of the I.A.M.).

- All members of staff at IAM Surety offices in Belfast are now also members of the IAM and therefore do understand the nature of advanced driving.
- 90% of IAM membership do receive "matched" or lower premiums upon yearly renewal.
- The over 70 age group member's claims are <u>higher</u>, than those of the <u>general public</u> who have not taken an advanced driving test of any kind.
- 60% of claimants took their advanced driving test more than 10 years ago.
- Some members may not have tested their advanced skills for over 50 years.
- Claims double after 5+ years since the taking of the advanced driving test.

When back at home I reflected on these statistics and how they related to my own situation. I took my test in 1993, (24 years ago). And though I have undergone assessments, as necessary, for Senior Observer and subsequently National Observer status, these relate to abilities in communication and Associate management rather than specific driving skills, certainly not a current advanced driving test. This begged the question, "do I now really know if I am still driving to an advanced standard" especially with the introduction of the new standards? My thought process led me to decide that there is only one sure way of finding out, re-take the test! This I have now recently done, and I can report that I passed.

During discussions at a recent Committee Meeting it was suggested that all Committee members should lead by example and retake their tests, all present indicated that they were willing to do so. **Christine Westwood**, **David Gallagher** (F1rst register certified pass) and **Jonathan Hughes**, have all recently passed tests including the latter gaining of a 'Masters' with distinction. It is hoped that all Group Members will consider the good sense of ensuring that their skills are up to cst with flying colours. If you are interested, then please contact me directly or any member urrent standards; your Group Observers are all here to ensure that you pass such a re-teof the Committee to make arrangements to move your skills forward; a taster or refresher drive can easily be arranged by your Group.

Are you a 'Young Driver'?

90,000 Members! Since 1956 the Institute of Advanced Motorists, IAM RoadSmart, has developed into a significant organization but sadly with not that many young members. A charity dedicated to improving road safety with a driving test based on the same book that the police use to train its very best drivers. As the best drivers on the road why does the IAM struggle to attract a younger audience? Unfortunately, I can't answer that, nor can anyone else it seems, but the organisation is trying very hard to try to fix this issue.

As a local group we have made a small and continuing contribution to the history of the IAM in that we have the first Young Drivers Contact outside of the IAM RoadSmart offices in Welwyn Garden City, and since we have launched our two new social media pages at www.facebook/ www.facebook/ www.facebook/ wolvesIAM.RS/ and www.facebook/wolvesiam.rs, (please do take the time to look, you don't need an account to view them), we have become possibly the first IAM RoadSmart Group to have both a Facebook page and an Instagram page specifically focussed on the younger driver.

I am 23 years old and from an early age I've been interested in anything with an engine; driving my neighbours ride on tractor when I was five to learning how to drive a car on the grounds of my dad's school aged eleven. At seventeen I passed my DVSA test first time. After being advised to pursue advanced driving at eighteen I took a course with the IAM called Momentum. I spent two hours with a police driver who showed me much of what influences the way I drive today. He encouraged me to go ahead and take my Advanced Driving Test. I enrolled onto the Advanced Driving Course in November 2015 and got a 'F1rst Register' pass.

As the Group's Young Drivers Contact, my objective is pretty clear but how it is achieved is far from straightforward. It is important to remember that the Wolverhampton Advanced Motoring Group has been around since 1982; some of the Group's original members are still here today. These long serving members carry years of experience and knowledge, not only of the Group, its Members, the local area but also Advanced Driving. What is apparent is that the route to the success and encouragement of a younger driver within the Group will be somewhat different to that which is currently meeting the needs and expectations of the existing Membership; there is no harm in this as is demonstrated through a dynamic Facebook and Instagram page on our web site; the two groups can co-exist and the goals of safer, more capable and more pleasurable driving can be achieved by both.

The easiest way to start being more attractive to the younger driver is to be more visible to that group of people to which end it is my intention to ensure that Wolves-IAM have a presence wherever we can at events which are attended by the under thirty-year-old driver. To spend time dispelling the belief that is often articulated that IAM RoadSmart is only for the older driver and is nothing to do with everyday driving and cannot be applied to the drive to work or a weekend away with friends.

To do this we need involvement and input from our Members. I'm not suggesting that you all become Group Committee members but we do need additional feedback and suggestions from our current Membership; notwithstanding the existing commendable schedule of activities that are managed by our Events Manager we need to introduce additional more involving activities specifically focussed at the younger driver; we not only need ideas for these activities but also our current Membership's support to help make them happen. Please don't remain silent, get in touch! My email address is <u>young.driver@wolvesiam.org</u>, I look forward to hearing from you.

So far, we have launched two new social media accounts, and produced fresh new business cards to promote what we do to those who may be interested. We are looking at ways that we can experience driving at the limit of our capabilities, (something I'm sure many keen drivers would love to do, but obviously not something that can be done on the road), with things such as skid pans, off road driving et cetera. The future is going to be very interesting and for the Group I hope very exciting.

IAM-RS Posted Blogs

Service, I say, Service!

Being safe, reliant and efficient road users are the key things that enable greater safety on the roads and allow them to run smoothly. It is vital to continue this mission of endless safety by maintaining your vehicle and ensuring that is serviced and up-to-date.

These tips give advice as to why it is important to get your motor serviced, from IAM RoadSmart's head of technical policy and advice Tim Shallcross.

• Make sure the oil and oil filter are changed on time and the correct engine oil is used; neglecting an oil change or using the wrong oil is the quickest way to increase wear on a modern engine, especially for highly stressed parts such as turbochargers and pistons

• Anti-freeze must be checked every year and should be changed every other year. It does much more than protect the engine in winter; it prevents corrosion inside the engine.Blown head gaskets are a typical symptom of not enough or old antifreeze

• Change the timing (cam) belt on time, when the mileage or age limit is reached.It might look OK and it's an expensive job, but if the belt breaks, it generally means you need a new engine

• The alternator drive belt must be inspected at each service and changed if worn or when the manufacturer recommends. If it suddenly snaps, you suddenly lose power steering on most cars

• The cabin air filter or pollen filter keeps clean air coming in through the heater vents. If it isn't changed on time, you may get debris in the heater unit which is expensive to remove and clear and you will be more prone to misted up windows restricting your view

Tim said: "Make sure the service is noted properly in the car's record book and the garage stamps it. A full, documented service history makes the car much easier to sell; no history or gaps can knock hundreds or even thousands of pounds off the price you'll get."

More sunshine ... more glare time

While any amount of sunshine is welcomed at this time of year, the glaring low winter sun is taking no prisoners. In 2015 dazzling sun was a factor in over 2,500 crashes including 17 fatalities. Even though we have many tools that aid in protecting us from the glare, we often forget to use them. This week's tips give advice on how to stay safe on the road with the glare of the sun on rampage, from IAM RoadSmart's head of driving and riding standards Richard Gladman.

• Keep your windscreen clean both inside and out. Dirt or salt residue will magnify the effect of the sun

• On the outside check for chips or cracks, replace worn wiper blades and make sure your washer bottle is kept well topped up with good quality screen fluid strong enough to avoid freezing

• Keep a cloth or chamois to wipe away the dirty film that builds up on the inside due to screen heating and condensation.

• Use your sun visor. It may sound pretty standard but a surprising number of people forget.

• Invest in polarized sunglasses and remember to take a rest. Your eyes will strain quickly if you are squinting.

Slow down and leave extra space between you and the driver ahead if you are dazzled. This will give you more time to regain full control and assess the situation. Richard said: "Low winter sun may not deliver a useful tan but a clear view of the road ahead is vital if you are going to get through the winter as safely." At the right speed, in the right gear to apply the right degree of acceleration ...

IAM-INFORMATION

THE ADVANCED DRIVING TEST

What the Examiner expects

The Test takes about 90 minutes, over all types of roads and using your own car. The four essential qualities are **Concentration**, **Observation**, **Anticipation** and **Planning**. The Examiner is the holder of a Police Advanced Driving Certificate. A full understanding of what is expected can be found in the IAM publication "Advanced Driving". A number of important points are mentioned here:

THE PRINCIPLES OF ADVANCED DRIVING

- Do you concentrate properly and avoid distractions?
- Can you read the road and anticipate potential hazards in good time?
- Are hazards dealt with in a planned and systematic way?
- Do you use your mirrors before changing your speed or position and do you always give a signal to other road users if they will benefit or appreciate one?
- Can you drive with reasonable restraint, but not indecision?
- Is your judgement of speed and distance accurate?
- Do you drive with courtesy and consideration for other road users, including pedestrians?
- Are you always in the right place on the road, travelling at the right speed with the right gear engaged and able to stop safely in the distance you can see to be clear?

HANDLING SKILLS

- Are steering actions safe, smooth and accurate, and do you pass the wheel through your hands?
- Are gears smoothly and correctly selected?
- Do you make full use of automatic transmission, if your car is fitted with it?
- Is your braking smooth and progressive?
- Do you use "acceleration sense"?

ADVANCED DRIVING SKILLS ON THE ROAD

- Do you keep up a reasonable pace and maintain good progress if conditions permit?
- Do you anticipate and react correctly to the situations developing ahead?
- Are the correct road position chosen and signals given in good time for the next manoeuvre?
- Are all signals, signs and road markings observed, obeyed and approached correctly?
- Are overtaking manoeuvres carried out smoothly, decisively and safely?
- Do you drive with proper restraint and proper sensitivity of control when the roads are slippery or visibility is reduced?
- Are manoeuvres such as parking, reversing, carried out smoothly and competently with effective all-round observations?

Advanced Drivers are expected to control the risks, despite the incorrect actions of others. Every journey can have its unexpected moments.

However, even successful candidates have made minor mistakes, which did not prevent them from passing the Advanced Driving Test.

New Members - are required to complete the Group Membership Form which can be downloaded from our website and sent to the Group Membership Secretary.


